PEACE OF CAKE

Fall at Lake Geneva, November 7-9, 2008 promises "food for women's souls."

Fall Retreat keynote, Nancy Vedder-Shults, well known ritualist, musician and innovator from First Unitarian Society of Madison, Wisconsin, will expand on the theme of women as peacemakers. Her Saturday morning keynote address, "Goddess Visions of Peace and Plenty" will give participants a sneak preview of her forthcoming book, *From Common Sense to Inner Wisdom*. Nancy will also participate in the panel discussion and videotaping.

Mid-morning workshop facilitators will use the theme of peace to introduce the vibrational universe and journaling. "Cup Cakes" workshops will deal with women's sexuality, body issues and committing to peace in an often-violent world.

The 26th annual Lake Geneva Fall retreat also offers an exciting panel discussion of women of action and peace, including two videotaping sessions moderated by Delinda Chapman, Abraham Lincoln UU Congregation in Springfield, Illinois. For eight years Delinda has hosted and produced a Public Access program in the Springfield market which often lifts up women's volunteer work in the greater world of peace, poverty and other social action.

"What Women Want" panelists include: Nancy Vedder-Shults, keynote speaker; Holly Kerr; (North Shore Unitarian Church in Deerfield, Illinois) and author, Jackie Jackson of Springfield, Illinois. Another panelist is yet to be named. The resulting videotaped programs will be distributed in various television markets in the Central Midwest District.

Shirley Ranck will be presented in Peoria, Illinois and Milwaukee Wisconsin, November 15th and 22nd respectively. As well, the volume looks at the global silencing and brutal treatment of women that has accompanied the rise of patriarchal religions and societies.

New Beginnings for Wisconsin RCRC:

The following are comments from Rabbi Bonnie Margulis who lives in Madison, Wisconsin about the renewed RCRC efforts in Wisconsin. She serves on the national RCRC staff as Director of Clergy Programming.

I had been the State Coordinator of the Wisconsin Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights from 2/79-10/91. So I knew that during the 30+ years leading up to the U.S. Supreme Court decision in April of 2006 (where the protection for the woman's health was thrown out by the Supreme Court) plenty had changed on the Choice political landscape.

Barrier legislation of all sorts had been passed in many states, i.e. parental consent laws, waiting period laws, blocking insurance coverage for women in the military, etc. Plus significant changes had been made in the make up of the federal courts including the U.S. Supreme Court.

But what got me back in the game was the shock of the 2006 ruling. That was a huge red flag fore me. To me it signified in no uncertain terms that Roe v. Wade's days were numbered. That the unthinkable - the question of whether abortion procedures should be legal - would come back to the state legislatures for debate. (Wisconsin already has an abortion ban on the books dating from 1849)

And now, on what could be the eve of the High Court dismantling legal abortion, the opposition is fixated on equating all non-barrier methods of birth control with abortion.

There are other pro-choice groups out there that are better known and better funded, but only the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice has the power to take the higher moral ground in the debate.

Thoughts on Leadership: Preparing the Supreme Meal.

It is interesting to think on the idea that the Women's Connection's newsletter is named *VOW*. Leaders, it might follow, "vow" to prepare and feed the "supreme meal" of programming at the Lake Geneva Fall Conference in November, **Peace of Cake: Food for Women's Souls** and other Connection events.

(Editor's Note: I've been reading about this sort of supreme meal preparation in one of my favorite inspirational books, *Instructions to the Cook* by Bernard Glassman and Rick Fields. (Crown Publishers, Inc NY))

The Zen principle discussed in *Instructions* councils us to provide the supreme meal to "all the hungry ghosts in four directions."

We all can experience the existential hunger of these ghosts. This might explain the passion to attend an appealingly themed retreat, because of the potential for feeding our own hunger and finding new skills to cope with our complicated daily lives.

Program planners, Councilors and other volunteers make a vow to put that supreme meal on the table for others. We all prepare such meals for our sisters in the Central Midwest District and serve them at two yearly retreats and other supplemental programming

According to Glassman and Fields, the "vow of the Zen cook is not something we promise to do and then feel bad or guilty about it when we don't accomplish it." Rather, a vow is an intention to do something." Perhaps we think that our meal must be limited, because our ingredients are limited—be it food, money, time, talent, etc. But a vow is not limited, by space or time. "We can make our vows as small or as large as we want. We can make a vow to feed one person, for instance, or we can make a vow to feed hundreds or thousands of people. We can vow to build housing for one homeless person or for hundreds.... We can even vow to end hunger or homelessness. The only thing that limits our vow is our imagination."

A vow has a very practical function too. "It's like a compass that shows us the direction to go in and that keeps us on course. But a vow itself is never enough. By itself a vow is all potential. It's like yeast or starter. But if we want to see our vow manifest in the world, if we want to bake a real loaf of bread for instance, one that we can eat ourselves and serve to others, we have to add flour and water and knead them all together. We have to add determination. When we add determination, vision takes on a life and force of its own. The loaf of bread we imagined comes out of the oven, ready to eat." (Continued)

Let the vow of the women who take on leadership positions in the UU Women's Connection governing council, retreat planning committees, special project committees or grant committees be this: "to continue to provide the supreme meal to all who hunger, including ourselves".

Participation and leadership in 2008-09 programs starts with a vow to feed members, friends, planners, councilors, perhaps even all the hungry ghosts in the four directions. 2008 is the year we celebrate our beginnings fifty years ago at Allerton and is appropriate for renewing vows. Won't you step up to leadership or membership? Come. Cook. Eat. Be fed.
