## **Historical Highlights: VOW's 40 Years. 1960s and 1970s "The Times They are A-changing."**

All 2007 *Voices of Women* quarterly newsletters will celebrate the publication's 40-year history. Various newsletter names were suggested over the years including: *Prairie Pioneer*, *CMD-UUWF Alertin'* and *In Touch*. The newsletter, however, was called the *CMD UUWF Newsletter* until 1979 when the *Voice of Women* name was introduced. It wasn't until 2005 that it became the *Voices of Women* during reorganization that began at the 2003 spring conference and Annual Meeting.

This issue's *Historical Highlights* will consider the 1970's, a decade of changing times for UUs in the district and in the Association. Just as the theme of the 1969 General Assembly in Boston, *Encounter with Change* reflected the changes the 1960s, Allerton Institute themes name some of these changes in women's lives.

The ideas and philosophy of the 60s became mainstream in the 70s - sexual freedom, the end of the draft, legalization of abortion, gay liberation, breakthroughs in women's rights and women's changing roles, focus on the environment to name but a few. Always ahead of the game the Allerton themes reflected these changes in the mid to late sixties. "Fight Against Waste," (1964) "Life and the Pursuit of Love," (1965) "Abortion: A Public or Private Concern," (1968) were but a few of the explorations and discussions.

The 1970 Allerton theme "Three Legs in the Evening" explored the middle years with a look at the *problems of generation gaps...the elderly and changing standards of the young*. By 1971 the Allerton theme and the work of the organization was beginning to declare as the Virginia Slims advertisement of the time that "We've come a long way, baby!" And indeed women had come a long way.

In 1971 the Allerton Theme was: "Women: Where are we Going?" Keynote Speaker Janet Bowering, Continental UU Women's Federation board member's address was titled "Keeping the Tightrope Tight." -- a *reflection of women's lives*.

In 1972 the Allerton Institute explored the subject of *women's responsibility in liberation and the importance of women's work being taken seriously* with the theme: "Hurrah for Women. A Profile of YOU in the 1970s." In 1973 the theme "Marriage and Its Alternatives" explored changing relationships. Other Allerton themes: "Close the Circuit: Communicate." (1974) "The Many Faces of Eve." (1975) "Role, Romance, Reality." (1976) "Honoring Thy Womanself" (1977)

The April 1977 *VOW* brought news of district discussions about the Women and Religion Resolution passed at the UUA General Assembly. *VOW* editor, Mildred Richards, reported women of numerous congregations were *meeting to examine their own religious beliefs and the extent to which these beliefs influence sex-role stereotypes.... It is gratifying to note that at least 2/3s of the church newsletters of this district report special programs dealing with this resolution.*

1978 theme was about "Dreams" and reflected an increasing interest in parapsychology, science fiction and Gestalt therapy. 1979 theme was "Bread & Roses" planned by the women of Madison and Milwaukee Wisconsin featured a team of creative artists and discussions on self-discovery through self-expression.

Many "Little Allertons" were reported in the April 1978 issue of *VOW*. Rockford, Illinois; Oak Park, Illinois; Eliot Chapel in St Louis, Carbondale, Illinois and other local retreats continue or have been reborn in recent years. Not the least of these retreats was the **Lake Geneva Fall Retreat** started by women of the Rockford, Illinois Congregation 25 years ago this fall. A feature report on this new-old phenomenon and a look at Rockford's part is planned for the fall *VOW*. Look for information of this year's celebration of 25 years at Lake Geneva in this issue. Join us in the fall for a look at *VOW Historical Highlights* of the 1980s and 1990s.
